





ELDERS

What follows is a short summary of the decisions and actions of the Session, at the July 16, 2019 Session Meeting. The minutes of the meeting will contain a more complete record.

- The meeting was opened by Pastor Don, who presented a "Pastor's Study" on an overview of corporate worship and administration of the Sacraments (Baptism and the Lord's Supper). The information focused on the responsibility of the Session and the Congregation in each of these.
- The Chairperson of the Pastor Search Committee (PSC) presented a brief report. They have elected officers and have begun gathering information for the Church Information Form (CIF), that will be circulated to prospective candidates. The PSC presented a list of additional information needed from Session. The requests were forwarded to the proper Ministry Team.
- Session received a financial report from Treasurer Dave Stephenson.
- Reports from the Ministry Teams were received.
- A motion from the Mission, Outreach & Evangelism Committee, to allow the use of the facility on either Wednesday or Thursday nights for a Sex Addicts Anonymous group was passed.
- Consent Calendar items on the agenda were passed without objection. These items included:

The Special Ministries Team moved that "Session approve providing a Marriage Retreat during the fall of 2019, and allowing use of FPC facilities not previously committed to another function".

The Special Ministries Team moved to approve conducting a talent tithe, similar to the talent tithes conducted in the past years, and providing the results to Session. The talent tithe will be passed out to the congregation during Sunday Services, explained and a request made to fill out the tithe and return it. The opportunity to complete an electronic version of the tithe may also be provided.

The Nominating Committee moved that Session review, modify if appropriate, and approve the Nominating Committee's mission of "anticipated FPC officer-slate vacancies" for nominating year 2019 – 2020. The Worship Ministry Team moved to change communion from the second Sunday in September to the third Sunday, September 15, 2019.

- A motion from the Personnel Committee, to set the salary range for the Children's Ministry Director Position from \$45,000 to \$50,000 was passed.
- A motion from the Personnel Committee, to set the effective salary range for the Senior Pastor from \$75,000 to \$90,000 was passed.
- Session approved vacation leave for Pastor Don, for August 1 through 9, 2019 and November 21 through 30, 2019.
- Session decided to task each Ministry Team to a period of "Budget Vision Casting" and have each team bring their "Dream Budget" to the August Meeting, to begin the budget process.
- Ruling Elders Jim Williams and Barb Page, presented a report on the recent General Assembly Meeting.
- Each elder will be developing a list of the Characteristics, Gifts, and / or Skills that the new Senior Pastor should bring to the position. Prior to the next meeting, these will be forwarded to the Clerk to be compiled. These will be discussed and pared to the list requested by the Pastor Search Committee at our August Meeting.
- It was moved, seconded and passed to hold a "First Jumpstart" event on Sunday, August 25, 2019. This will be a time to get a "jumpstart" on the new church year. The event will be held after each service on that Sunday.
- It was moved, seconded and passed to hold a Session Retreat on Saturday, September 21, 2019 from 9:00 am to 6:00 pm. The retreat, "20/20 Vision & Beyond" will focus on setting a vision and goals for the next 3 to 5 years.
- It was moved, seconded and passed to allow use of the downstairs portion of the facility, by Classical Conversations, one day a week, from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm from August through November and January through April. The use will include 5 to 7 classroom and the kitchen. Classical Conversations is a Christian-based home school program.

The next Session Meeting will be held on August 20th at 6:00 pm in the Church Conference Room.

What About Those Flowers?



Have you ever wondered about the fresh flowers that are on the communion table every week? How do they get there? What is their purpose besides being a welcome bit of color especially during the long winter months? I don't know when the practice started to put fresh flowers at the front of the church, but I can make an educated guess. I think the early pioneer women began the practice. When I was a child, the ladies of the church would bring a bouquet from their gardens during the summer months to share their abundance, to brighten the sanctuary, and as a sweet smelling gift to the Lord. As more and more women began working, there were fewer people who had time to grow flower gardens, and gradually a standing

order at a local florist replaced the home-grown bouquets. So what do the flowers stand for and how are they used? Certainly during special seasons of the year, the front of the church is filled with blossoms appropriate to the season. Poinsettias at Christmas are called "Flowers of the Holy Night" but that story can wait until December. At Easter, we fill the church with Easter Lilies that signify rebirth and a new beginning.

During the rest of the year, the flowers are up to you to designate. You can honor the memory of a loved one, celebrate the birth of a child, wish a happy birthday to a friend or family member, publicly acknowledge an anniversary or graduation, honor your parents or other special person, etc. You can do this by signing up for the date of your choice on the flower sign-up list in the hallway by the main entrance. List the basic information and your name to have your request printed in the bulletin. A \$40 contribution should then be placed in the offering plate to cover cost of the flowers that Sunday. If you should want a certain type of flower, a larger arrangement or other special order, let the Worship Committee know well in advance, so the florist can be notified in a timely manner. In that case you would be welcome to take the arrangement home with you.

What happens to the flowers after the second service ends? The deacons take the arrangement to someone in the congregation who could use a cheering up, who is hospitalized, someone who is ill, bereaved, lonely, facing surgery, etc. This process completes the triple purpose of the flowers: beautification, honoring, and cheering/comforting. Please consider participating in the long-standing tradition.

Report on Vital Church Ministries Recommendations

A year ago our church had an evaluation done by an organization called Vital Church Ministries (VCM). They laid out a number of challenges for us, and gave us recommendations on how to address each of the challenges. You are being given this report to keep you informed about what our church leadership has been doing in response to these recommendations.

Vital Church Ministries (VCM) listed four "Core" issues and one "Taproot" issue that they felt our church needed to address. This report will go through each of them and tell what has been done, is presently being worked on or still needs to be addressed.

Core Issue #1 Pay Attention to What it Means to Be the Church

Recommendation 1 – Reestablish Biblical Community by Rethinking Your Small Group Ministry

Our Session has created a committee to work on developing a small group ministry as well as other specialized ministries. Some Session members suggested the groups focus on the topics of evangelism, discipleship, conflict resolution, and emotional health along with deep biblical studies. The establishment of Koinonea (community and sharing fellowship) is one of the most important results of a small group ministry, so the importance of participation by members of the congregation cannot be over emphasized. As the committee goes about setting up small groups, we as individuals must make the effort to participate.

Recommendation 2 – Learn to Resolve Your Conflict in a Biblical and Redemptive Way

- VCM saw two conflicts in the church. One was the conflict that had arisen over Andy and Dave, and the other was a demonstration of uncharitable attitudes among attenders of 1st and 2nd services towards one another.
- After having had a congregational meeting on the issue and also having an Elders' Corner, neither Session nor Pastor Don feels that there is more immediate action that can be directly done to address the conflicts that arose over Dave and Andy.
- To prevent future problems, the Personnel committee is working to establish some new personnel policies and Pastor Don, our Interim Pastor, is working with Session to help the elders learn to take stronger leadership.
- Although Pastor Don and the worship committee do not feel that there is a present problem of conflict between the two services and are concerned about changing schedules that can result in loss of attendance, Session is continuing to look into some possible changes.
- Pastor Don has been equipping the congregation to address additional conflict in a biblical and redemptive manner through his preaching.

Recommendation 3 – Develop an Emotionally Healthy Spiritual Life and Relational Skills

Core Issue #2 Be Intentional About Your Spiritual Formation

As Pastor Don has been preaching through the Book of Acts, he has been able to touch on this issue in some sermons. However, addressing this has been challenging. VCM's recommendations involve using small groups. But very few of our congregants participate in small groups. It may be that more effort on this will have to wait until we build up our small groups.

Recommendation 4 – Reconsider Your Church-wide Spiritual Formation Pathway

Session has split our Christian Formation committee into two committees: Adult Christian Education and Children's Ministry, reflecting our desire for increased effort to go into the spiritual formation of our congregation Both committees are working on developing pathways towards an organized process for spiritual growth.

Core Issue #3

Revisit Leadership and What it Means to be a Leader in the Congregation

Recommendation 5 – Reinstitute a Leadership Training Process

Our interim pastor, Pastor Don, has been training the session in leadership and how to build committees and pass along leadership skills to members of the congregation.

Recommendation 6 – Go Through Some Kind of Re-visioning Process

- Session will be having a retreat in late September to go through this process.
- Session reviews our mission statement and vision statement at the beginning of each monthly meeting.

Core Issue #4 Governance is Dysfunctional and Ineffective

Recommendation 7 – Get Help from the Presbytery of the Pacific Northwest in Governance

- Session has had a training by the presbytery and Pastor Don continues to train us in polity.
- By September, job descriptions and responsibilities will be created or up-dated for each Session Committee, and the Personnel committee is working on a complete set of personnel policies.

Taproot Issue

In Many of Your Minds, This is not Jesus' church, this is Your Church

Recommendation 8 – As you consider the findings of this report, enter a season of prayer and fasting that results in Sacred Assembly.

This has been talked about but not acted on.

Recommendation 9 - Move your worship service times closer together so that each congregation can actually relate to the other.

This has been discussed. Since adult education classes are between services. Worship committee has not found a way to do this. Discussion continues on this issue.

Shorten the second service so that families with young children can come.

This has been done.

Attend a different worship service. Get to know people there. Greet visitors.

Some congregants have been doing this, and we encourage others to follow in their paths.

Have a coffee hour in between services and stick around so you can get to know people in your church.

There are some logistical problems with the coffee hour approach, but our encouragement of congregants to sit with people they don't know when they attend church pot-lucks seems to have produced some results.

Recommendation 10— Staff an intentional interim pastor to help you work through these issues. We have done this and find that our interim pastor, Pastor Don, has been very intentionally moving us forward on most of these issues.
