A Spiritual Spring is on the Horizon!

A glance to the clear blue skies tells me that Spring is in the air, in spite of temperatures recently hitting the -40's. The season of Lent, which begins with Ash Wednesday this year on March 1, has long been referred to as the Church's "springtime." "Why is that?" you might wonder. It's because Lent leads us over 40 days to the season of Easter. During Lent we examine our lives and in the Spirit's power, turn our lives over to the transforming goodness of God. In other words, out of the darkness of sin's winter emerges a people—the Church—reborn in their Lord's resurrection.



Easter is the oldest Christian season. The observance of Lent first appeared between the years 200-300 AD. Lent was a *time of preparation* for persons being instructed in the Christian faith in preparation for their baptism. Following the model of Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1 -11), new adult converts practiced self-examination, repentance, and prayer for 40 days, waiting to receive their baptism, confirmation and the first Lord's Supper at the Easter vigil.

Today Lent calls us to look back on the impact of our own baptism upon our lives. At baptism we are asked:

Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God? Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God? Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God? Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Lord and Savior?

Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love?

Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord?

Take some time to reflect on these important questions. How are you doing, you who have died to sin and come alive to new life in Christ? Are these vows being taken seriously in your life? If not, what is getting in the way and what steps might you begin taking to walk in the freedom of Christ?

Maybe it's time to turn from your erroneous ways and walk in the new life of God's Spirit. I invite you to intentionally experience a "spiritual Spring."

The season of Lent is 40 days long (excluding Sundays) and leads us to Holy Week's bitter/sweet story of God's sacrifice and Easter's joyous victory over the powers of death.

I invite you into this season of spiritual focus. Focus on our loving God whose sacrifice for us calls us to live sacrificially and passionately for him. Give focus on where you are today, spiritually. Invite God to show you where you need to turn to him and trust him more. Spend time in his Word daily. Consider reading a chapter of Gospel of Luke each day or following our daily readings in the news-letter or available on the table in the narthex. I have downloaded an App for my phone called Book of Common Prayer – Daily Office Readings. Each day provides the reading and the phone will even

read them out loud for you so you can listen to the Word on the way to work. Enter into a season of prayer. Ask God to speak to you and to move in your life and in the life of his Church.

Spring is in the air and the opportunity for a spiritual Spring in your life is available if you're open to the Spirit's movements. New life is possible, because God is for you and makes his life available to all. All we have to do is open our lives to God in a spirit of humble surrender.

Lententide, 2017

Dear FPC saints,

Before we came to Alaska in 2010, we spent eight years in Illinois. In our town, during the six weeks which comprised Lent- everyone, and I mean everyone- every Friday would head over to Our Lady of Lourdes gym around 5pm for the fish fry. Where for \$7/head you'd visit with your neighbors, while the Knights of Columbus would shovel Fish, Fry's, Cole slaw and wonder bread at you- in copious and unhealthy amounts. It was great. I loved Lent in Sparta, IL.

At some point one of the kids, and I can't remember which one, asked- why this only happened just before Easter. We explained it was Lent, and traditionally a time of abstaining from meat. Prior to coming to Sparta, we spent three years in Canada in an Anglican church, were a modified Lent was practiced by the whole community. Giving things up, never meat— but really trying to narrow down our lives, going sparse for six weeks- not to please God, or earn His favor- but rather to hone our appetites and desires- to deny ourselves certain pleasures- which are good and blessed by God, but which in our ongoing idolatry slake a thirst only ultimately satisfied by the person of God himself. As St. Augustine says in his *Confessions*, "Our hearts are ever restless, until they find their rest in thee."

In his essay, *The Weight of Glory,* CS Lewis writes these words, "It would seem that Our Lord finds our desires not too strong, but too weak. We are half-hearted creatures, fooling about with drink and sex and ambition when infinite joy is offered us, like an ignorant child who wants to go on making mud pies in a slum because he cannot imagine what is meant by the offer of a holiday at the sea. We are far too easily pleased."

Now, I'll be the first one to admit, I'm far too easily pleased. I identify with Oscar Wilde who said, "I can resist anything... except temptation." Ask me how well I do around cake and pie and all the good stuff Barb makes!

All this to say though, I think there is something very wise about the church year practices that many Christian traditions follow, Lent being one of them.

This year we're once again having an Ash Wednesday service on March 1, at 7pm. Every Tuesday at 12:15 we have a time of prayer. Beginning March 5th, every Sunday through June at 10am, we'll be "reading, marking, learning and inwardly digesting," the book of Hebrews. Read a book- something by CS Lewis, read a classic-Bunyan's *Pilgrims Progress.* Take a social media fast. Avail yourself of this time of year.

Bad Neighbor

Jesus tells us to "love your neighbor as yourself." What do you do when your neighbor's kids continually make bad choices and have a negative influence on your children? Banning them from your yard doesn't

seem to like a very Christ-like response. Ask God, "How can our family become a positive influence in the life of our neighbors?"

Every situation is different and the answers are not always easy. That's why you should seek wisdom from God through prayer. After all, God put you next door to that family in the first place. Invite the neighbor's kids over to your house where you can control the type of play, the environment, and the rules.

You will also be setting the example for your children on how we are to treat people that don't act and believe the same way we do. Even if we don't agree with their choices, we can make a stand and still treat them with kindness and love.

Jesus didn't say that we are to "love our neighbors as ourselves" only when they do what we approve of. Nope He said "love our neighbor as ourselves" period. We have to ask ourselves and teach our children to ask the question "Do we want to be treated or spoken to that way".

Yes, boundaries and rules have to be set in place. If the child breaks those rules? Then there must be consequences. But, they must be consequences steeped in love and forgiveness, because weren't we in that same place when we first met Jesus? Facing the consequences of our actions? Hard as it maybe, we must remind ourselves that this difficult "neighbor" is someone Jesus died for just like you and me.

You never know what doors your kindness will open. Perhaps that's why Jesus chose to hang out with Zacheaus. He saw the opportunity, not just the problem. You've heard it before, "Touch a child and you touch the world". – Miss Connie
