One of the things and have had regularly reinforced is that when you live your life in Christ you always get

MORE THAN YOU EXPECTED. It is not logical nor can it be scientifically proven. It is just a strange kind of math, unique to Christianity.

I heard an illustration of this in the past week. There are these two dim-witted hunters who are out Some might say that you are wasting your time or hunting for wolves in the mountains. These men are being paid to capture the wolves alive - and if they do - they will be paid \$5,000 a wolf. One night, the two hunters go to bed in their sleeping bags in their tent, and one of them is awakened at 3:00AM to the sound of a pack of growling animals around them. One of the men gets out of his bag and tent to find that they are surrounded by 50 snarling, angry, seething wolves. One guy shakes the other and says, "Hey Ned, wake up, You're not going to believe this, but we're rich."

More than you expected is what Jesus offers Consider your GIVING to the Church. Some may suggest that you are the poorer for doing so. You may think you are simply supporting the Church. Instead, you are the recipient of three things unexpected. The JOY of knowing that you were a part of the solution to the needs of others is one. What you have done mattered in big ways: the hunger of others, the teaching of Christ to children, the worship of hundreds and your faithfulness to the Gospels. Second, there is the JOY experienced by those who have received from your giving. They were helped when they knew that they could not help themselves. And there is God's JOY in watching you fulfill His Will.

Or consider your gift of LOVE to another. Some I have discovered might suggest that we are simply being a patsy. You may think you are simply expressing your feelings. Instead, you are the recipient of the FULFILLMENT that comes with watching another person built up, encouraged and feeling accepted. Second, they are grateful and comforted that there is someone out there who cares about them. Third, God is pleased when we have obeyed His Commandment, "Love one another as I have loved you."

> Or consider your gift of FORGIVENESS to another. letting another off too easy. You may think you are simply letting "bygones be bygones." Instead, you are the recipient of the BLESSINGS that come with forgiving another. First, you take the burden of anger and hate off your own shoulders for another. What a relief. Second, the one you have forgiven has the guilt of their actions taken off their conscience. A relationship they valued and then lost is restored. Finally, God is pleased when we do what we say every time we recite the Lord's Prayer, "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors."

> It is a strange kind of math; 1-1=3. You may feel lesser for your giving, loving, forgiving, like wolves circling your camp. Instead, you are so much richer than you ever expected. Think about it. May God make you rich in all things.

Worship the Lord with Your Tithes and Offerings

(A meditation on Psalm 107)

Psalm 107 (NIV) exhorts the people of God to express thanks and to bring thank offerings to the Lord.

"1 Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good; his love endures forever. "

"2 Let the redeemed of the LORD tell their story— those he redeemed from the hand of the foe, "

Who are the redeemed of the Lord? In the OT it was the nation of Israel. We, the Church, are also the redeemed of the Lord.



This refrain appears at the start of each of the five sections of this Psalm. "Let them (the redeemed of the Lord,) give thanks to the Lord...." In the first four sections the psalmist describes many ways God delivered Israel and ways he delivers us today. In the fifth section the psalmist observes many of God's loving acts.

"8 Let them give thanks to the LORD for his unfailing love and his wonderful deeds for mankind, "

"9 for he satisfies the thirsty and fills the hungry with good things."

God is the source of our very being and of the resources that we enjoy

"15 Let them give thanks to the LORD for his unfailing love and his wonderful deeds for mankind, "

"16 for he breaks down gates of bronze and cuts through bars of iron."

God sets us free from the prison of sin.

"21 Let them give thanks to the LORD for his unfailing love and his wonderful deeds for mankind."

"22 Let them sacrifice thank offerings and tell of his works with songs of joy."

Let us worship God with our tithes, offerings and our songs of praise.

"31 Let them give thanks to the LORD for his unfailing love and his wonderful deeds for mankind."

"32 Let them exalt him in the assembly of the people and praise him in the council of the elders."

Let us share the good news of God's salvation.

The Session of First Presbyterian Church meets on the third Tuesday of each month in the church's conference room. The February Meeting was held on Tuesday, February 19, 2019. The meeting was opened and closed with prayer.



• Pastor Baird read from 1 Corinthians 12: 12-26, which speaks of the church being one body with many parts. Each part has

its own gifts and abilities to be used in the way that they have been called to by God. This led into a discussion on the composition of the Session's Ministry Teams and how they could be used more effectively.

- The Worship Committee moved to approve Communion being served on the second Sunday of each month of 2019, beginning in March. The motion passed.
- The Worship Committee moved to approve combined worship services on Sunday June 9th and Sunday July 14th to include Communion. The motion passed.
- The Worship Committee moved to postpone making a decision on how to utilize the hour between services until a new Children's Ministry Director and/or a new senior pastor are in place. The motion passed.
- The Personnel Committee moved to increase the Youth Ministry Director's salary in order to compensate him for his increased duties. His Job Description was also changed to outline these new duties. The motions to increase his salary and to approve his updated Position Description passed.
- The Stewardship ad Finance Committee moved to approve minor changes made to the 2019 Budget at the January Session Meeting.
- The Hospitality and Fellowship Committee moved to approve a potluck after the second service on Sunday March 10, 2019 at 12:30 pm.
- A Congregational Meeting for Healing and Reconciliation has been scheduled for March 24, 2019 at 12:45. A fundraising lunch will be provided by the youth, between the end of the second service and the beginning of the meeting.
- Session voted to realign the Ministry Teams of FPC to better cover all the ministry responsibilities set out in the Book of Order. Starting in June 2019, one Ruling Elder will be responsible for each of the following Ministry Teams; Stewardship & Finance, Worship, Facilities, Congregational Care, Adult Ministry, Youth Ministry, Children Ministry, Personnel, Fellowship & Hospitality, Special Ministries, Nominating, and Mission, Outreach & Evangelism.
- Session began the discussion on the process by which they will gather names of members to be nominated to the Pastor Search Committee.

The next meeting of the Session will be at 6:00 pm on March 19, 2019.

Long Range Planning

Combined services are scheduled for June 9 and July 14. Communion will be served possibly with a social event following.

Leadership Qualities

In addition to being a church member for at least two years and in consideration of both natural talents and spiritual gifts (Rom. 12:3-8; I Cor. 12:8-10; 28-30; Eph. 4:11-12; I Peter 4:9-11), a nominee for Elder or Deacon can be expected to exemplify the following qualities:

Faith - A definite, unreserved response of faith to Christ in surrender of one's life (past, present and future) with evidence of the Holy Spirit in life's relationships.

Freedom - Ability to love oneself and warmly love others with affirmation and encouragement. Ability to communicate what Christ means personally, to help people give their lives to Christ, to counsel them about problems and pray with and for them.

Flexibility - Openness to God's will above customs, cultural patterns and church heritage evidenced in the desire to focus on the Word of God to be liberated from secondary loyalties so our church can act, not react; and can lead, not reflect our culture.

Finances - Evidence of leadership in giving to the church.

Fellowship - Ability to give oneself in deep, Christ-centered relationships so the Session and Board of Deacons can be the church in miniature. Times of study and fellowship are not an optional adjunct to business matters, but the essential ambiance in which we seek the mind of Christ for the church together.

I want to share a wonderful resource for parents, young people who love video games, and anyone interested in seeing Christ engaged and praised in pop culture. There is a great ministry called 'Love Thy Nerd'.

They see the gamer subculture as a place where very few people are told that Jesus loves them or that there is more to life than here and now. The founders and supporters of the group are themselves gamers and enthusiasts of pop culture. They're not interested in waging a culture war in the name of Jesus, but rather find it far more fruitful to (like Reinhold Neibuhr last century) engage the culture, bring analysis and critical thinking, and finally point out places and values within the pop culture that point to the transcendent truth of God's grace in Jesus Christ. They do this with excellent writing on their website, visiting conventions like Comic Con where they proclaim the good news of Jesus in fun and engaging ways, and by hosting social media groups that foster thoughtful discussion and Christian fellowship. One valuable piece recently published on their website is a list of games to play with your kids that are more fun and meaningful than Fortnite.
