World, depart, let Jesus in!

One of my annual traditions during Holy Week is listening to the St. Matthew Passion by J.S. Bach. My favorite aria occurs near the end of the Passion. Joseph of Arimathea asks Pilate for Jesus' body in order to place it in a tomb. The bass aria, "Mache dich, mein Herze" is an intimate, enfolding text based on Matthew 28: 57-61. Bach tenderly incorporates a comforting, gentle-rocking orchestral accompaniment, while Joseph asks for a pure heart so that he can make a precious grave for Jesus.

Like Joseph of Arimathea, this message is for us as we now celebrate the empty tomb: that Jesus would purify our hearts and make his dwelling – more and more – within us.

"World, depart, let Jesus in!"

Below is a translation of the aria from the German text:

Make thyself, my heart, now pure, I myself would Jesus bury. For he shall henceforth in me More and more Find in sweet repose his dwelling. World, depart, let Jesus in!

From the Pastor ~~~~~

Friends in Christ,

It seems that a Sunday does not go by when someone asks me about the Pastor Search process and when will it be finished. This is a good question and I assure you I'm not taking it personally. I am loving my time in Fairbanks, but I know it won't last forever. So I have put together a general outline as to how Presbyterians find a new pastor. It is important that you know this as you are an important part of this process.

1. The Session is presently putting together a 7 member nominating committee to be given to you next month and voted on June 2 at our Congregational Meeting.

2. The elected Pastor Search Committee (PSC) will begin its weekly meetings upon being elected to put together a Church Information Form (CIF) that describes the demographics, nature, history and culture of First Presbyterian Church. Then an essay is written describing Fairbanks, Alaska, and its demographics, nature, history and culture. This will take about 60 days.

3. That CIF will be sent out to the nation through a variety of search engines. Your suggestions and input are very welcome at this point. If you know of a pastor that you would like to see called to ministry at First Presbyterian, pass that name on to the PSC.

4. Resumes will be received and evaluated, with some being interviewed and their references contacted. This will take any where from 4 months to 1 year. This part of the process will not be public.

5. When all those names submitted have been narrowed down to one, then the PSC will ask the Session to call a Congregational Meeting to have you vote "Yes" or



"No" for this candidate. Before this meeting, there will be a time to get acquainted with the candidate and hear this person preach in worship.

6. Then, EUREKA! We have a celebration and begin a new chapter in the history of Fairbanks First Presbyterian Church.

Now all of this is going to need two things. First it needs your prayers. Each one of us needs to keep the PSC in prayer, encouraging them as they pour themselves into this task. They won't be able to tell us much, but they will be working hard. Second, it will take time. It may take up to a year or more. Be patient. I will do everything I can to make this in-between time meaningful and spiritually equipping. This is not wasted time, but could be extremely productive personally and institutionally.

God bless us as we continue this adventure of being the First Presbyterian Church of Fairbanks.

What follows is a short summary of the decisions and actions of the Session, at the April 16th Session Meeting. The minutes of the meeting will contain a more complete record.

The meeting was opened with a Devotion and Prayer by Elder Donna Brewer. Pastor Don's "Pastor's Study" was from Ephesians 4:25-28.

The Session conducted the three month review of the Transition Pastor Don Baird, and the Transitional Pastor Covenant.

It was moved, seconded, and passed to discontinue the Elder Corner program at this time. The Congregation Care Ministry Team and Hospitality Ministry Team will be discussing replacing it with a Prayer Corner.

Session continued to discuss the makeup of the Pastor Nominating Committee.

A building use request from a 12-step program was received and forwarded to the Mission and Outreach Ministry Team for action.

RE Jim Williams brought a motion to "continue participation in the Loving Families Program". The motion was seconded and passed.

The revisions of the Personnel Policy and the Sexual Misconduct Policy were tabled until the May Stated Meeting.

RE Barb Page moved to "direct the Facilities Team to investigate the installation of a panic button for the Administrative Office". The motion was seconded and passed.

The next Session will be held on May 21st at 6:00 pm in the Church Conference Room.

Learning about Stewardship

Parents have an important role to play in teaching and demonstrating stewardship to their children. A wave of nostalgia washed over me upon learning that an offering is taken in our children's church. This started a period of reflection on how I had learned about stewardship, the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care.

I learned stewardship at home, not in the public schools and not in Sunday school. It started with the dime left under my pillow by the tooth fairy. A dime was a lot of money. With a dime I could buy two ice cream cones.

With 25 cents I could even buy my favorite lemon ice cream soda at Woolworth's soda fountain. My mom told me that, because "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world and all who live in it," (Psalm 24: 1 NIV), I should give part of my newly acquired wealth to the offering at church. She taught me that a tithe would be one penny from my dime. After giving the penny, at least part of the remaining nine cents could be saved. Some could be spent for that coveted ice cream cone or the entire nine cents could be saved and later maybe there would be enough to get an ice cream soda. When I was older, my dad offered to let me use a piece of land to do a 4-H commercial garden project. His suggestion that I grow strawberries was followed up with a visit to the neighboring county where a strawberry farmer taught me how to set up a commercial strawberry patch. Next, mom taught me how to keep a double entry ledger for tracking all income and expenditures and how to manage a checking account. My parents encouraged me to save for college and to make an offering to God as part of my worship. The fact that my parents always put something in the offering plate taught me that giving is important. My parents guided me to establish a pattern of tithing, saving, and spending wisely.
