Summer has flown by, and we're well into the ramp up to Winter's icy grip. The air is crisper, the trees turning a dusty green mixed with yellow, leaves beginning to fall, middle aged men acting like giddy school boys at the thought of tramping through the woods in pursuit of that elusive Bull— all signifying a change in seasons. Change is in the air.

One of the changes which is taking place at FPC is in our Children's ministry. A year ago, after Connie left, Children's ministry team and several elders began a conversation - not on who we wanted our next Children's ministry director to be- but rather, what were the outcomes we wanted for our kids to come away with from FPC children's ministry program. Two things came from this conversation-1) we wanted to increase our kids biblical literacy-the big picture story of God's actions for us found in the Bible- Creation, Fall, Redemption, Maturing in



Christ and Glory, and 2) We wanted to better equip families- parents- to be involved in their children's spiritual formation, and maturing in Christ.

As a result of these prayerful conversations we've contracted with a Children's ministry coach to assist us in developing a program 1) that is effective in accomplishing the two goals mentioned above, 2) is simple to implement for volunteer leaders with busy lives, and 3) doesn't cost a lot of money.

An ordered, deliberate Bible Story Telling is what we're implementing. The curriculum is the Bible. The cost is next to nothing. The method is story-telling, and then assisting the kids to wonder about it. Bible telling will take place for K-3rd grade during the 8.30 and 11am services. For 4th-6th graders, this will happen at Roots, in a more youth group environment, Sunday afternoon. 4th-6th graders will stay in the upstairs worship service on Sunday mornings.



Commissioner's Presbytery Report

Presbytery of the Pacific Northwest held it's very first meeting on January 26 & 27, 2018 at First Evangelical Presbyterian Church, Oregon City, Oregon. (The number of churches in Presbytery of the Pacific increased to the point that it became necessary to form two Presbyteries: Presbytery of the Pacific Northwest and Presbytery of the Pacific Southwest.)

Dave Moody and I attended the World Outreach Workshop Thursday afternoon. (World Outreach Committee meets the day before Presbytery and usually holds a workshop in the afternoon.) The teaching time during the Presbytery meeting was also focused on World Outreach.

The primary calling of EPC World Outreach is to the work of full-cycle church planting among least reached and unengaged people groups with a particular focus on Muslims. World Outreach has three tracks to accomplish this calling.

- **ENGAGE 2025** Vision of Engage 2015 is for each Presbytery to establish a church planting team among an "unengaged" Muslim group by the year 2025.
- ITEN The International Theological Network is an equipping ministry of EPC World


 Outreach. Working in 10 sites around the globe, ITEN's vision is to see indigenous leaders
 gain higher theological education in order that they can equip and teach their own to go tell
 the story of Jesus among people who have no church, especially Muslims
- **WO CO-OP** In areas outside our expertise, EPC World Outreach workers partner with other approved mission agencies. WO CO-OP workers are full members of WO and their co-op agency, They go through the application process of both agencies but oversight and coaching of the workers on field comes primarily through the co-op agency, not WO. In order to be more effective in church planting, Presbytery of the Pacific Northwest has developed clusters of churches that join together to carry out church planting and other missions. We are part of the Puget Sound cluster.

Our cluster is seeking a focus for church plants. We have churches with different sizes and different resources, but together each church has a chance to contribute to the church planting effort. Chapel Hill, the largest church in our Presbytery, wants to see 3 new churches planted in the Pacific Northwest. They are putting 1% of their budget into church planting. Evergreen Church with its 80 members created a designated fund for Church planting. They are small, but they are putting 1% of their budget into the church planting fund. FPC in Redding, CA (part of a different cluster) has 130 members and is devoting 1% of their budget to church planting.

Conversation in the Puget Sound Cluster has revolved around 2 areas, Pierce County, WA (the 2nd most populated county



in WA which has underserved areas) and Spokane. (There have been requests for an EPC plant in the Spokane area.) See map on the next page. The outlined area is Pierce County. There also have been requests for an EPC Church plant in the Seattle area. TE Jamie Richard, a member of our cluster, is working out-of bounds with SIM International. He works with Somali immigrants in the Seattle area. He located a source of bottled Camel milk and has made connections with Somali merchants helping them obtain their beloved Camel milk. He brought some for us to try. The camel milk was delicious.

I really couldn't differentiate between it and cow's milk. Jamie is making friendships that will provide

opportunities to share the gospel with these Muslim immigrants. EPC has a carefully thought out strategy for church planting involving three factors - Person, Place and Plan. The person desiring to be a church planter is assessed and approved by the EPC Church Planting Assessment center. The target area for the plant is carefully assessed. A long-term plan is developed. (5-year strategy, with goals, vision and budget)

Since this was our very first meeting as Presbytery of the Pacific Northwest, there was a lot of housekeeping business to take care of all of the Teaching Elders and the Churches were received into Presbytery

- Committee chairs and members were approved for the seven committees of Presbytery
- Corporate officers were elected. (According to the state laws of WA)
- Bylaws for the Presbytery were approved.
- Per member asking was raised to \$20 per member.

Three overtures sent to Presbyteries by GA (descending overtures) were approved. Two REs were examined and approved to become Commissioned Lay Pastors. Jim Day will be lay pastor at Reflections Church in Meridian, ID. Mike McCandles will serve as a lay pastor to provide pastoral support to the congregations of the Klamath Falls and Mt. Shasta area churches.

We approved the recommendation from the session of First EPC of Oregon City that one of their own, Suanne Kohl, who grew up in their church, and aspires to be a TE, come under care of Presbytery. I had an opportunity to meet several of the ten ruling elders I have been interviewing on the phone and emailing as part of my Ministerial Committee duties.


